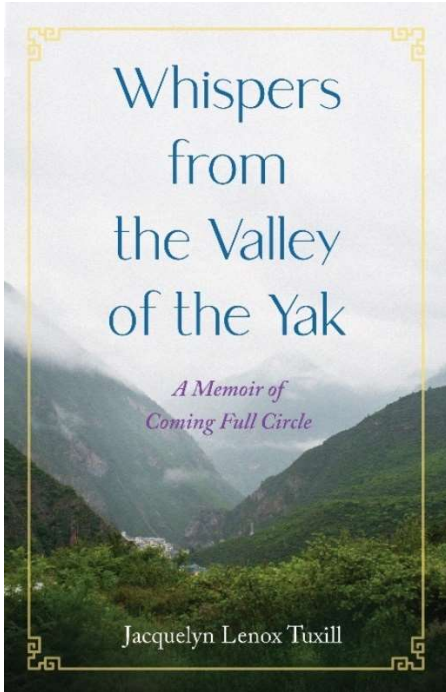

Whispers from the Valley of the Yak weaves an intergenerational story about the power of forgiveness and being true to oneself. When Jackie returns to her Chinese birthplace with her aging American parents, profound questions arise about love and family. These questions set Jackie on a quest to understand her troubled childhood and what she wants from life. Living in Alaska for five years, she discovers an affinity for the mountains and begins three decades of environmental work. Later, Jackie returns with her adult children, retracing her parents' 1932 footsteps into Tibet and making peace with her past.

Jackie's life has been anything but ordinary from the very beginning. Born in 1942 to medical missionary parents in Chengdu, China, she was a toddler when her family fled the escalating war between China and Japan, flying "over the Hump" of the Himalaya Mountains to India. In Mumbai they waited six months for passage home to the United States.

Following a childhood in West Virginia, Jackie lived in Alaska for five life-changing years, gaining a love of mountainous landscapes and outdoor adventure. Her passion for the environment led to a thirty-five-year career, based mostly in New England. For the past decade she has focused on writing and editing.

Jackie is a cum laude graduate of Muskingum College (now University) in Ohio and completed masters level coursework at the University of New Hampshire. *Whispers from the Valley of the Yak* is her first book.
